## What are you going to do? Who is going to benefit? 3 When is the work going to happen? • Why is it essential that the problem needs to be solved? Make it clear that you and your staff know what you're doing. Present a clear outline of who will 4 be doing the work and highlight the skills and experience of your staff and leadership. If you are requesting renewal funds, clearly state what has been accomplished already and why 5 continued funding is needed. Develop clear goals and measurable outcomes that, if accomplished, will provide evidence of the 6 success of your work. 7 Set a realistic timeline for what you can accomplish in the proposed grant period. Make sure the budget and the proposal narrative are aligned. The budget should use the same 8 words used in the narrative. Be responsive to all the questions that are asked. If a question feels repetitive, assume the funder is 9 looking for similar information from a different angle. Have someone not familiar with the project read your application before you submit it to make 10 sure it makes sense.
