Building & Preserving Collections

The Library is charged with managing permanent access to legal materials, especially those pertaining to Maryland law. These materials include print and microform materials as well as significant digital content. The Library works independently and in partnership with Legal Information Archive (LIA) to collect and digitally preserve state government publications.

Collection Management

Staff completed a full inventory of Maryland House and Senate Journals in FY2025 and reorganized them for enhanced access. This collection provides records of proceedings of the Maryland General Assembly and are valuable resources for legislative history.

Digital Collection & Digitization

In FY2025, the Library expanded efforts to preserve and digitize legal resources. Staff began harvesting Differentiated Case Management (DCM) Plans from each circuit court, as required by Maryland Rule 16-302. To protect collections and improve access, 500 reels of *The Daily Record* (1929–2022) were sent to the Maryland State Archives for digitization. The Library also continued archiving key government webpages, including Executive Orders, Baltimore City Office of Inspector General (OIG) reports, and Public Information Act (PIA) documents.

The Library remains active in the Legal Information Archive (LIA), a consortium with Georgetown University, Harvard University, as well as the Virginia and Washington State law libraries. In FY2025, Reference & Digital Collections Librarian Brian Hamilton became a database administrator for the project.

Federal Government Documents Collection

The Thurgood Marshall State Law Library is a long-standing member of the Federal Depository Library Program (FDLP). As a selective depository library, the Library receives and makes available certain classes of federal government publications and documents. In keeping with the FDLP move to a digital program, the Library is in the process of transitioning to the status of selective online depository. As part of this shift, Library staff joined in collaborative meetings with the federal collections departments of the Harford Community College Library and the University of Maryland College Park.

In April 2025, the Library hosted Scott Matheson, the Government Printing Office's Superintendent of Documents. The visit was an opportunity to exchange critical information about federal documents management and upcoming changes to the FDLP.

Collection Review


The Library's comprehensive collection review in preparation for a future building move continued in FY2025. Staff conducted extensive research on each item and title to evaluate continued relevance, condition, and research value to our patrons. Titles determined to be no longer of service to the Library's needs are made available to other libraries for their own collection development.

The FY2025 review included the Library's extensive genealogy and history materials, narrowing the collection focus to Maryland-specific materials. Many titles removed from the collection have found new homes at the New York State Library, the Genealogical Society of Pennsylvania and the Friends of Irish Research in Massachusetts.

The Library's non-law magazine collection has likewise found new homes in local libraries and museums around the state, including the Busch Annapolis Library and the Enoch Pratt Free Library's Central Branch. Materials can be readily accessed for research purposes at their new institutions.

Database Collection

The Proquest database, *Recent Baltimore Sun*, was added to the Library's digital newspaper collection. This database provides access to the *Sun* from 2008 to current day and is distinct from other access points as it includes high-quality reproductions of newspaper photographs in addition to article text.



Special Collections

A new bobblehead was added to the Library's extensive collection. Justice Elena Kagan joins Justice William Rehnquist, Justice Sonia Sotomayor, and Justice Antonin Scalia, among many others produced by *The Green Bag*, a satirical law journal. Justice Kagan is depicted standing in front of a crystal ball, a reference to an opinion she authored, explaining that "the courts below did not gaze into crystal balls, as the majority tries to suggest." *Rucho v. Common Cause*, 588 U.S. 684 (2019).

The Library collaborates with the Maryland State Archives regarding ongoing conservation efforts. Special Collections books were examined for detached covers or pages, loose bindings, torn or brittle pages or other signs of fragility. Those needing special care began moving to the Archives in batches for repair and maintenance. Some will be boxed in a new style of custom boxing that includes a window to the original spine of the book.

Promoting Access

The Library connects patrons to its collections through the provision of information services, expansion of access to digital materials, and enhancing web-based information resources and tools. These efforts increase the Library's efficiency and make Maryland legal information and history readily accessible to researchers.

Hours of Service

Effective January 1, 2025, the Library implemented new hours of service. The Library is now open Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 7:30 p.m., and is closed on weekends. The change ensures that more staff are available during the hours of highest library usage. The Library now has three staff who regularly work at the reference desk in the evenings.



Reference Activity

This reference summary presents information about direct interactions between reference staff and patrons, as when a patron contacts the Library with a request for legal information or research assistance. The summary does not discuss other ways in which patrons frequently interact with the Library, such as through websites or databases, use of the physical collections, or participation in Library education and outreach programs. Patrons often visit the Library and make use of Library resources and facilities without interacting with staff.





The majority of reference desk interactions involve the general public, at 82%. Interactions with Judiciary staff account for 8% of the total. As the Library grows its digital content and webinar trainings, Judiciary staff are increasingly able to access Library resources without direct reference desk contact. However, Judiciary staff often contact the Library with complex research requests, including requests for state and local legislative history and regulatory history.


Over the past decade, the time required to appropriately address a patron query has increased significantly. In FY2015, 60% of reference interactions took 5 minutes or fewer to address and only 3% took longer than 30 minutes. In FY2025, 25% of interactions took 5 minutes or fewer, while 26% of interactions took longer than 30 minutes. Nearly 10% of reference interactions require at least an hour of staff time. Anecdotally, staff have seen a significant rise in the complexity of requests received from public patrons.

Aspen Discovery

In FY2025, the Library implemented Aspen Discovery as its new public catalog platform. Aspen provides users with a modern, mobile-responsive interface to search the Library's print materials, ebooks, and websites. By integrating these resources into a single, user-friendly search environment, the Library is making it easier for patrons to discover and begin using digital materials while also improving access to traditional print holdings.

The Aspen Discovery project was a collaborative effort across multiple Library departments, which continue to manage the system's maintenance and enhancements. While the new catalog is now the primary search tool for the public, the Library has retained its legacy catalog to support librarians at other institutions who continue to rely on it for their research and reference work. Aspen Discovery has been well received by Library patrons and exemplifies the Library's commitment to improving access to legal information.



The People's Law Library (PLL)



The People's Law Library, a project of the Thurgood Marshall State Law Library, gives Marylanders clear, reliable legal information on court procedures and issues such as housing, family, health, and life planning. In addition to nearly 500 articles, PLL connects visitors to Court Help Centers, the Library's Information Desk, legal service providers, and statewide legal clinics.

In FY2025, staff reviewed and updated 27% of PLL articles, focusing on employment, guardianship, education, and government benefits. New resources addressed emerging topics, including immigration policy changes, the Maryland Child Victims Act, and adoption record access.

PLL relies on Maryland attorneys who volunteer their expertise to review and improve content—ensuring resources remain practical and accurate for self-represented litigants.

This year also marked the start of a major Drupal CMS upgrade. Alongside the migration, staff assessed site content with an eye toward how generative AI tools are reshaping online search. This work will guide future initiatives in Generative Engine Optimization, ensuring PLL remains visible and accessible.


Despite broader shifts in online search behavior, PLL site visits remained strong, declining only 4% from FY2024.

PLL Statistics



Most users reach PLL through Google searches. In FY2025, click-throughs from Google declined 7% as AI Overviews appeared more frequently in results. While PLL content often surfaced in these summaries, research shows users are less likely to click through from an AI Overview than from a standard link. Despite this trend, PLL's search impressions more than doubled, rising from 7 million to 17 million per month.



PLL analytics suggest information-seeking habits are shifting. Traffic from ChatGPT grew from zero in July 2024 to 1,239 visits in July 2025, reflecting greater reliance on chatbots to summarize content rather than directing users to original sources. Because generative Al tools operate as "black boxes," PLL cannot see how often its content is used within these summaries.

Creating Educational Opportunities

Enhancing the understanding of law and legal information is a powerful component of the Library's mission. To that end, the Library develops educational materials, programs, events, and exhibits for the Judiciary, the bar, the public, and specialized groups within the library community as a part of the Library's continuing in-reach and outreach initiatives.


In-Reach Education

The Library provides regular instructional sessions for the Judiciary, including orientations to collections and services for incoming law clerks and interns.

Additionally, Library staff work in partnership with the Judicial College of Maryland to present informative and practical guidance on research methods and resources.

The Library's Digital Mini series partnership with the Maryland Judicial College continued in FY2025. The year's lineup featured sessions on Maryland Legislative Materials & Legislative History (Scanned Collections); Maryland Judicial Materials (Scanned Collections); VitalLaw; West Academic; Maryland Legislative Bill Files (Scanned Collections); and HeinOnline.

In addition to the Minis, the Library worked with the Maryland Judicial College to offer two webinars to Judiciary personnel: Research Resources for the Legal Professional; and Ghosthunting: Searching for Maryland Legislative History.

Law on the Frontlines: Legal Reference for Public Libraries

Now it its seventh year, the *Frontlines* project continues to provide valuable training to public library staff on legal resources and legal reference services. FY2025 sessions included the longstanding basics, Best Practices for Legal Reference (aka Basics I) and Foundations of Law for Public Library Reference (aka Basics II). In addition, the year included sessions focused on Landlord-Tenant Law and on Legal Forms.

There were 157 learners attending the six fiscal year sessions; and eighteen (18) of Maryland 24 county library systems were represented. In addition, learners included representation from county and state correctional libraries, community college programs, several university system libraries, and several state government agencies.


The Frontlines Workgroup continued addressing the multiple tasks required by the complexity of the project. Training began for new instructors; promotion of sessions was extended to better connect potential learners to the sessions; and the workgroup began an update of the Frontlines website content.

Tours & Visits

Library staff routinely conduct tours for new judges, law clerks, and judicial staff, with more formal tours arranged for students from various academic programs, including law schools, undergraduate and community college legal studies. Special focus is given to tours of the Special Collections Room, spotlighting the Audubon copperplate engravings.

In addition to these regular tours, in FY2025 the Library hosted tours for groups including the Prince George's County Law Links Program; Eastern Technical High School; the Towson High School Law & Public Policy Magnet Program; St John's College; visitors from the State Justice Institute; and a visiting group of British scholars. In all, the Library hosted twenty-seven (27) tours in FY2025 for a total of 205 visitors.

Staff Development

Library staff engage in diverse professional development opportunities to elevate service provision. Staff take advantage of development opportunities from internal library workshops, Judiciary-offered classes, vendor-sponsored events, professional conferences, and educational tours.

In-House Workshops

The Library launched a series of workshops to support the deeper learning of legal research methodology and reference provision. These Reference Continuing Education (RCE) workshops are designed and taught by Library staff for Library staff. FY2025 RCE workshops were provided on Legal Encyclopedias; Case Law Research; and Reference Interview Deep Dive. The workshops provide an introduction to legal research for onboarding new reference staff and serve as a refresher for seasoned reference providers.

Professional Conferences

Professional conferences are a crucial part of staff development for both education and networking. Library staff engage in conference programming as both learners and as presenters. In FY2025, the Library sent one or more staff to:

Development Courses & Classes

Throughout the fiscal year, Library staff seek opportunities to cultivate and reinforce knowledge and understanding of our field. The practice of librarianship is one of constant change; to continue providing outstanding stewardship and service, our staff expend significant effort to keep current in practices, management, and collections.

In addition to opportunities provided in the Library and through the Maryland Judicial College, staff connect with many other organizations for top-tier learning. FY2025 included online coursework from CALI, Library Juice Academy, and the Midwest Collaborative for Library Services (MCLS); webinars from the National Center of State Courts, the Law Library of Congress, OCLC, the Conservation Center for Arts & Historic Artifacts (CCAHA), Library Works, Goucher College, and Johns Hopkins University; and professional development courses and webinars from AALL, the Maryland Library Association, and ALA Learning.

Staff took advantage of learning opportunities in the areas of cataloging, artificial intelligence (AI), preservation and conservation, technology security and privacy, collection development, digital resource management, professionalism and ethics, contract management and administration, grant funding, disciplinary and grievance processes, copyright, customer service, civics, business writing, legal research methodology, researching constitutional law, United Kingdom legal research resources, and more.
